
A STAY AT KATHY'S HOUSE CAN Transform Lives

Kathy's House makes that journey possible for more than 1,500 quests each year. Located on the Milwaukee Regional Medical Center campus, Kathy's House is the only hospital quest house in southeastern Wisconsin that provides lodging for patients and caregivers of all ages receiving care at all area hospitals.

Moreover, Kathy's House is intentionally designed to promote holistic healing, with designated spaces and accommodations for everything from laundry to cooking, remote work, fitness, and spirituality. In a recent survey, 99% of quests said that they would recommend Kathy's House to a family member or friend.

Stronger Together

When 22-year-old Noah Toth was facing cancer for the second time, his medical team recommended a bone marrow transplant at Children's Wisconsin. The Illinois resident spent six weeks in the hospital followed by on-going outpatient care. Because of Kathy's House, Noah was never alone.

Noah's three adult brothers and his parents stayed at Kathy's House, alternating as caregivers, staying in a suite specifically designed to protect patients whose immune systems are compromised. Access to lodging allowed Noah's parents to use family leave to be with him, saving travel time, gas money, and the cost of a hotel.
